Future funding needs are for surgery expenses, general operating costs and for building technology infrastructure and training staff. All 15 staff members at Plaster House are Tanzanian. She also expressed thanks to FCC for its support over the years. Plaster House recently celebrated its 10th anniversary.

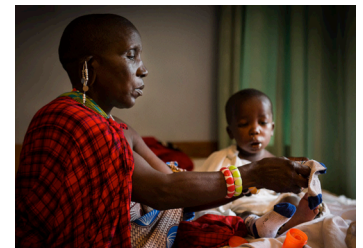
"Faithfulness" theme of Stewardship Campaign

Faithfulness

Plaster House, the surgical and rehabilitation center for children in Arusha, Tanzania, continues to expand and continues to help children overcome physical disabilities through surgery. Amy Dunlop filled the FCC congregation in on the latest achievements of Plaster House during worship on October 7. She and her husband Steve have worked with Plaster House for many years, Amy as a teacher and Steve as a surgeon.

Children with genetic disabilities such as club feet or clefts, or children who have been injured in fires or other accidents come to Plaster House for surgery and rehabilitation. New buildings were opened in 2017, bringing the total of beds for children to 80, although there are often 100 kids being served at any given time.

**Voices and Views****Dan Adolphson*****Practice self-care in these difficult times***

When I was in junior high (1980), a new TV station was born. The Cable News Network, founded by Ted Turner and part of the Turner Broadcasting System, promised news around the clock. Critics at the time panned the station – *who needs news all the time? There isn't enough news for a 24-hour news station!*

Time has sure proven Mr. Turner's critics wrong, hasn't it? When the station went live, the launch of the first iPhone was *27 years away*. Now we can know whatever we want, when we want to, on our TVs, our computers, and our smartphones. And, in these moments where, as followers of the Gospel of Christ, we stand for truth, justice, inclusion, and radical welcome, it's not hard to become overwhelmed.

My friend and colleague Fr. Shay (whom some of you might remember from when his church met at SpringHouse on Sunday afternoons in our early years at SpringHouse), asks the same question of the Twitterverse each week:

Checking in! Have you eaten? Gotten outside? Moved your body (even a little)? Taken your meds? Had some water? Checked in with a friend? Found a way to laugh? Listened to some music?

I also want to add the following:

Have you checked in with God? Are you listening for God's voice in these moments?

It's not always easy to do this. We are pulled so many different ways these days. Yet, even Jesus practiced self-care. All throughout the Gospels, there are stories about how Jesus went away by himself to a quiet place. *We care for ourselves so we can care for the whole world.*

For the techies among us, I have a new self-care resource to recommend. *Our Bible App* is the first LGBT affirming bible app; creating devotionals for progressive Christians that uplift believers of ALL stripes. Through devotionals highlighting pro-LGBT, pro-women and encourage interfaith inclusivity, *Our Bible App* hopes to provide a tool that is needed to create healthy prayer and meditation habits. For all of us, I encourage us to take Fr. Shay's words to heart. Breathe deep. Take care of yourself. Listen for God's voice.

Rev. William Barber wins Genius Grant

Well-known social justice advocate and pastor of Greenleaf Christian Church in Goldboro, North Carolina, William J. Barber II has been selected as one of



25 people to receive a MacArthur "genius" fellowship that comes with an unrestricted \$625,000 grant. According to the MacArthur Foundation, the fellowship is reserved for "talented individuals who have shown extraordinary originality and dedication in their creative pursuits and a marked capacity for self-direction."

Dr. Barber spearheaded the national New Poor People's Campaign, which members of

SpringHouse congregations studied and participated in this year. When the award was announced, Dr. Barber was in Chicago at a protest for raising the minimum wage; he was arrested during the protest.

Franklin Avenue Homeless Encampment

If you have been paying attention to local news over the past few weeks, you are familiar with the homeless encampment that has steadily grown at Franklin and Hiawatha.

The City of Minneapolis and other agencies plan to transition the residents of the encampment to temporary transitional housing, shelter or more permanent housing by moving the encampment by the end of the year to a new Navigation Center directly across Hiawatha from the current encampment on land owned by the Red Lake Band of Chippewa.

If you are interested in helping these neighbors, here is what you can do:

1. Check out the website, franklinhiawathacamp.org. The website is the clearinghouse for all donations and services. There are links to give financially through the appropriate groups supporting the community in specific ways as well as daily needs for "stuff" and volunteers.
2. Some goods are being accepted, especially winter clothing, non-perishable food items, water and other items. Do not drop any items off at the encampment. Check the website to see what items are needed and where to leave donated items.

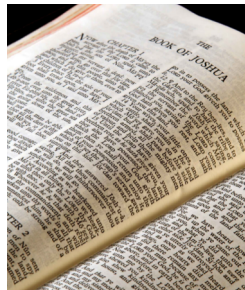
